Long-term impact



Expanded to Arequipa and Piura


Last year we were able to expand outside Lima and started operations in other coast region cities of Peru: AREQUIPA AND PIURA.

Expansion is important. Lima has ~30% of Peru's population and therefore a high concentration of stray animals, but that centralization is the reason that stray animals outside Lima barely receive any help. In 2021 we were able of spay and neuter 380 and 273 animals in Arequipa and Piura, respectively, and this current year we want to expand even more and arrive in the Andes and Jungle of Peru.




Efficiency as a core value to drive more impact

Focus on the most vulnerable ones

We focus on animals that otherwise won't be fixed: animals from low-income families, shelters, and strays. During 2020, 33,3% of our benefits animals were strays, and in 2021 we almost doubled our rate of stray animals neutered/spayed.



Helping low-income pet owners



We love helping pet owners who care about their pets but are not able to afford spay/neuter surgeries costs at a veterinarian hospital. Their love for their pets force them to be creatives. Usually they bring their animals on laundry baskets or boxes instead of a pet carrier

Education is key

We launched an educational page in Spanish where a dog Firulais and a cat Bigotona are the ones teaching humans on how to be a responsible pet owner. Our content has reached +9K people in Peru. The pillars are Health (e.g. spaying, vaccination), Safety (e.g. microchip), Diet, Wellness & Training.

TNR campaign

Trap-Neuter-Release. Most of the stray animals we neutered/spayed are via TNR campaigns and one of our main focuses is feral cats due to their high reproduction rates. In 2021 we had 37 TNR campaigns and fixed 369 feral cats.
